# Finishing a Decade in Players' Style By Player Allan D. Dick

Twas well before Christmas and all through the week, every show was rehearsing, and hoping to peak. Then Folic night what to our wondering eyes should appear? But three gallant one-acts to accompany our beer (Mea culpas to Clement Moore). The evening of this 639<sup>th</sup> Frolic began with the usual welcome – not by our illustrious president (who was out of town). Rather, by the Vice President of Administration, **Mickey Champion**, who flawlessly delivered the usual messages and then introduced **Bob Lee** to lead us in the singing of *The Players Song*, which he did with great enthusiasm (It was his first time doing so).

Then it was off to the first of the evening's three shows, *Cheech & Chong's Christmas*, a comic skit built around the classic Cheech and Chong Christmas standard (?), *Santa Claus and His Old Lady*, adapted and created by a **Nick Stojkovski**, **Tom Ball**, **Sean Fisher**, **Tom Starynchak**, the latter two also identified as the show's directors. **Nick Stojkovski** portrayed Cheech Marin, with **Tom Ball** playing Tommy Chong in the present. The show attempted to implement some of Players new-technology with the full-size movie/video screen. But with jack-of-all-trades Nick on stage (and not in the light/sound booth), there were a few tech snags, showing a clip of the actual Cheech and Chong movie. But, it's Players and it seemed appropriate for the show.

Once past that, the laughs were easy – and intended. After setting the scene, and the cannabis-based humor, we flashed back to a more youthful setting, where **Kiernan Babcock** appeared as a younger Cheech, and **Spencer Channel** as young Chong. **Matt Ochab** then got into the act as Santa, with the scene returning to the present for the *Santa and His Old Lady* routine, which Nick and Tom had pretty well down pat. A fun way to begin the evening.

Next up was a bit of something old, something new. "Old" in that *Sherlock Holmes and a Case of Revenge* was (by this writer's recollection and account) the third Sherlock show directed by **Bob O'Leary** (who also admirably produced this evening's Frolic) in recent years, involving the same core group of actors. "New", because not only was it a different Sherlock play, director Bob took some liberties with the script, writing in a few new roles to keep the gang together.

That gang consisted of **John O'Hara** as Holmes, **Gordon Price** as Dr. Watson, **Jim Callahan** as Professor Moriarty, **Ron Miotke** as Yusef, **Bill Volz** as Elizabeth, and **Tim Flintoff**, showing off his comedy chops in an expanded Mrs. Hudson role (Sherlock's housekeeper). A pre-curtain scene was cleverly added to introduce and justify the ghostly additions to the cast. The director later confided that it was the single malt scotch that made them invisible (I admit I did not pick up on that).

## Roof and Air Conditioning Replacement

Our *Beautiful Lady* requires some tender loving care. Many of you are aware that our 30-year-old roof and air conditioning system have been causing problems recently, most visibly manifested by roof leaks over the Founder's Room. The Board of Governors believes we will have to tackle this project in the next year and a half.

Thanks to the generosity of many members, the Endowment Committee has been able to replace the stage rigging and the building's boiler. Right now, we have just under \$80,000 set aside for the roof and air conditioning project. Preliminary estimates are that this project will cost \$150,000.

If you have not yet made a pledge to the  $2^{nd}$  Century Fund, we could use your help. Your contribution will help us keep our *Beautiful Lady* in good repair as she approaches her  $2^{nd}$  century.

Endowment Committee meetings are open to anyone. If you would like to come, the next meeting is at Bill Champion's home at 6:30 pm on Wednesday, February 12<sup>th</sup>.

But, the "gang" cruised through another Sherlockian deduction (with Watson's help) to solve yet another mystery – this one focused on revenge. It was clear that the cast enjoyed their roles (and maybe some of the single malt?) Another success for Bob O.

The playbill closed with another oldie, which director **Glenn Scoles** fondly recalls being a part of in 1988! **The Scheme of the Driftless Shifter** had Players written all over it. The show centered on the efforts of a bumbling cast and crew's efforts to produce a classic melodrama. But, from the premature opening of the act curtain, to misplaced sound cues, to wigs coming off, to goofy special effects to confusing exits and, of course, several missed or confused lines, this was pure Players' fare! It made one wonder just how many rehearsals did this take to "perfect"?

The meager plot, involving the Poppington household. Henry humorously father portrayed by Kiernan Babcock, focused on the budding romance of daughter Petunia, executed to perfection by Jared TenBrink, with her seemingly penniless suitor, Victor Strongheart, William Wu returning to the Players stage. As you might expect, her father will have none of this. The play opens with the Poppingtons' maid, Gladys, scurrying about setting the stage (so to speak) and periodically appearing in her efforts to assist, Bob Lee surely must have enjoyed that bumbling role. The other member of the household was daughter Marigold, John Sobiesiak (we'll be seeing more of him), whose appearance remind me of Tim Flintoff's Mrs. Hudson.

This being a melodrama, it calls for an occasional dramatic piano accompaniment. Enter **Alinuru Yasin** as the mock piano player. Stage manager **Mark Habel**, and stage hands **Dave Clark** and **Tom Starynchak**, made goofy cameos in attempts to correct scenes one way or another, as did director **Glenn Scoles**. Everyone got into the act, including the morethan-ever valuable Prompter, **Dennis Leroy**.

#### **Keep it Clean Gents**

The Players does not have a full-time janitorial staff. We do, however, have regular visitors, including organizations that have paid good money to rent our facilities or are considering doing so.

If you are at the Playhouse for a rehearsal or for other reasons, please clean up after yourselves. That includes properly emptying ashtrays and wastebaskets and washing mugs or other dishes. If you don't know how to operate the dishwasher, please don't try. Instead, rinse your dirty dishes and leave them in the sink. Don't just leave an inch of beer in a mug waiting for the rats to drink it.

Access to fire exits, *including the basement access to the area under the stage*, must be kept clear. Likewise, we are legally obligated to provide unimpeded access to the DTE meters in the basement. Please do not pile props or furniture there.

Please talk to V.P. of Production **Andrew Ballantine** or Stage Manager **Nick Stojkovski** before adding to our ever growing collection of props and furniture. This way, we can keep the basement and stage clean and safe.

Directors, actors and producers: You are responsible for returning props to the prop room, cleaning out the dressing rooms and makeup room, and returning furniture to its proper storage location.

#### Did You Know?

Did you know that you can search for Frolics by name, actor, director or Frolic number on The Players website? You can also search through back issues of THE PLAYER by typing in a date range. For example, by searching for Frolics directed by Player **Bill Robinson**, one discovers that Player Robinson has been responsible for such artistic gems as *Thunderbird*, *Frontier Accountant*, *Wasting Away*, *The Footsteps of Doves*, and *The Rewrite* in just the past five years.

In sum, the accessible database contains enough trivia to make Player **Will Dawson** proud. "I'll take May contenders for \$1,000, Alex."

So, just how does one gain access to this treasure trove of trivia? First, go to: <a href="https://www.playersdetroit.org">www.playersdetroit.org</a>. Next, click the "Member Login" link at the top of the page. The username is "players" and the password is "frol!c". (Note, the "o" is a zero and the "i" is an exclamation point). At the bottom of the members page, click on "search for a frolic."

#### **Our Dress Code**

Part of what makes The Players unique is our traditional dress code. From the inception of our organization, Players have been required to wear "black tie" (a tuxedo) at our Frolics and Invitationals. While guests are encouraged to do the same, a dark business suit is acceptable. Tuxedos can be purchased for surprisingly low prices – often less than the cost of a rental. Members are responsible for informing their guests of our policy (and for paying any guest fees.)

The Players also maintains a tuxedo bank of tuxedos that may be loaned to guests. Sizes are limited, so it would be best to plan ahead and see what is in the basement. If you have grown, shrunk or simply tired of your current tux, consider putting your tux in the bank.

#### Be Our Guest!

This year, the number of guests attending our frolics may have reached an all-time high (at least in recent history). Inviting a guest to attend a frolic is an important tool in our membership recruiting efforts. In fact Article VI of our By-laws provides that invitations are generally "limited to prospective members."

As Players, we are all responsible for ensuring that our membership base remains strong. It goes without saying that a strong membership base is essential to our financial health. It is also essential to our ability to put on our monthly frolics without having to rely on the same few Players every month. When you bring a guest, please follow up with an invitation to apply for membership. Applications are available in the lobby.

While joining our historic organization is not right for everyone, most guests are flattered by the invitation. Guests may not be aware of how reasonable our dues are. They may also not be aware that it is not necessary to appear on stage, with or without a dress.

Take a look at the banners that adorn the theater. They represent a cross section of the skills required to put on a show, including writing, music, art, financial acumen, and set design and construction. In other words, there is something for everyone (I'm not sure what happened to the bartending banner). 


